The SAW Project

We are always looking for ways to make our curriculum as creative as possible so we were delighted to welcome the SAW project to Year 6 for two days this week. SAW—the science, art and writing initiative—breaks down the

traditional barriers between the arts and sciences. Having taken soil samples from the school grounds during the previous week the children were amazed to find that large numbers of bacteria had grown in their petri dishes. Close study of the bacteria and mapping their genomes showed the children how many helpful pathogens exist in nature. Dr Wilkinson talked to the children about his revolutionary research on Leaf Cutter Ants in his search for new antibiotics.



Using the science as inspiration, the children were inspired to cre-

ate poems and artwork based on the bacteria. They enjoyed expressing themselves using inks and oil pastels to produce some fascinating artwork. The project has given us all an insight into the world of science, art and writing and has hopefully inspired the next generation of scientists.
