Way back in the mists of time we introduced pocket toys to improve playtimes in school for the children. 

Ladybird Maths

After reading the story, 'The Bad Tempered Ladybird' by Eric Carle, the children have been playing some ladybird maths games this week. At Group Time, we played a game comparing the spots on each side of a ladybird. To choose the amount for each wing, we rolled a dice and then counted out that number of spots. We looked to see if it was the 'same number' or 'different' on each wing. We then identified which side had 'more' and which had 'fewer' or 'less'. The children were amazing at remembering the dice dot patterns that we have been practising recently and many of them could 'subitise' - saying how many without the need to count!
