Head Lice Are Back!



Over the past week we have received reports from a number of parents that they have found head lice in their children's hair. As is always the case, once these tricky little creatures are established they spread across the school very quickly. The only way to really keep them at bay is by regularly checking your child's hair.

The NHS recommends that you check your child's hair every week using a fine toothed detection comb (available from pharmacies) in the following way

- wash hair with ordinary shampoo
- apply lots of conditioner (any conditioner will do)
- comb the whole head of hair, from the roots to the ends

It usually takes about 10 minutes to comb short hair, and 20 to 30 minutes for long, frizzy or curly hair. Do wet combing on days 1, 5, 9 and 13 to catch any newly hatched head lice. Check again that every-one's hair is free of lice on day 17.

If you find live lice or eggs (nits) it is very important that you treat your child's hair immediately and other members of your household. Your pharmacist will be able to advise you about suitable treatments. Sadly there is nothing you can do to prevent head lice but you can reduce the risk of head to head transmission by checking your child's hair thoroughly every week and by keeping long hair tied up as this reduces the opportunity for head lice to catch on to children's hair. Thank you for your vigilance.

Unfortunately, the National Education Union has been unable to reach an agreement with the government regarding a fully-funded, above inflation pay rise for teaching staff. Consequently, members of the NEU will be taking further strike action on Tuesday 2nd May. In addition the NEU executive will make a further announcement in May if they will be holding three days of strike action in June and July.

Legally, members of the NEU do not have to inform their Headteacher if they are taking strike action, so it is difficult to determine the extent of the disruption the strikes will cause. We will endeavour to give parents and carers as much notice as possible if some classes do have to close and apologise in advance for the disruption this will inevitably cause.

All decisions regarding the closure of classes will always be made on Health and Safety grounds as the safety and wellbeing of all our children remains our priority. Thank you for your understanding.

Introducing the Governors

What does a school governor do? The governors work with the headteacher and the staff at our school to make sure the school provides the highest quality education for all its pupils. Our governors come from a range of backgrounds but they all have the ability to listen, think through new ideas and decide what is best for the school as part of a team. The governing body provides strategic direction for the school, works with the headteacher to raise standards, promotes the well being of pupils and ensures the school is accountable. When not supporting Mrs Howell and the staff in school, Sharon works as a Registered Forensic Psychologist in private practice.

Sharon says, "I believe that in my role as a governor, I am able to cast an independent eye over the workings of the school and assist and work alongside

the existing governors in carrying out their important and valuable work." Sharon is passionate about improving children's emotional health and mental wellbeing and feels we should all work together to provide the best outcomes possible for every child.

Nail Varnish and Jewellery

This week, the children were thrilled by the arrival of our four live caterpillars. When they first arrived they were really tiny, but each day they have grown visibly bigger. We have enjoyed listening to the story of 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar' as well as watching a real life film of a caterpillar changing into a butterfly. We have learnt some new vocabulary such as 'cocoon', 'chrysalis' and even 'metamorphosis'! The children were totally in awe of this process and are looking forward to watching the life-cycle progress with our class caterpillars before they are released into the pre-school garden.

The children have also taken the minibeast theme into their child-initiated play, searching for bugs in the garden and using the magnifying glasses to look at ladybirds, worms and ants they have found.
