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## Safety in the Sun

The warm weather has been welcomed by us all this week after a long, hard Winter. We are very fortunate to have our wonderful field where the children can run and play. However, it can get very hot and we are aware of how damaging exposure to the sun can be.

During the hot weather please can you ensure that your child has the following in school:

- A water bottle so that they can remain properly hydrated throughout the day (please name your child's bottle);
- A sun hat;
- Sunscreen (please name your child's bottle).

## Year 2 Florence Nightingale Day



We know that children learn best when they are fully immersed in a topic so we try to provide them with inspirational opportunities to live and breath the history topics they are learning about through our 'Wow History Days'. This week Year 2 were transported back to 1854 where they found themselves in the middle of the Crimean War. Visiting Scutari Hospital they joined 'the Lady with the lamp', Florence Nightingale, in her mission to treat many of the injured and sick casualties. The children set to cooking wholesome meals for the wounded soldiers, providing clean and hygienic wards, and teaching the trainee nurses about the importance of keeping rats and

other vermin out of the hospital. Having made their own lamps, the children brought comfort to many of their patients as they patrolled the wards with Florence. Everyone had a great time in their role-play, learning many new facts and developing a better understanding of the important role Florence Nightingale played in developing the country's Health Service and the modern standards of nursing.



## Mending Words

The children in Violet and Indigo classes were so enthused by their work with Florence Nightingale learning how to heal human patients, their teachers decided to extend this into other areas of their learning. In their grammar lessons the children have been learning about apostrophes of omission, which can be quite a tricky thing to grasp, so they were set the challenge of mending words. I think you'll agree that their word repairing was very successful.

## Year 4 Stibbington Visit

Children in Year 4 travelled to the village of Stibbington this week to discover what life was like for evacuees during the second world war. Arriving at the railway station, clutching their gas mask cases, the children waited expectantly to receive their luggage labels which gave them their new identity for the day and to discover where they would be billeted. At the school they learnt about rationing and played with period toys in addition to traditional lessons in singing, spelling and arithmetic. The highlight of the visit was the air raid which featured planes, bombing and a visit to the air raid shelter.

Ask your Year 6 child to tell you the events which make up a decathlon.

Following on from the excavations the students at the Village College designed and curated their own museum to show-

case the excavation and the finds. Our Year 5 children visited last Friday and were most impressed by the interactive displays. They thoroughly enjoyed having the


opportunity to talk to the students about their discoveries and trying their hands at the many activities on offer such as reconstructing pots.

## Monkfield Park Care & Learning Centre Holiday Club

Over the half-term holiday period the Care and Learning Centre holiday club will be running from 8am to 6pm daily. The Holiday Clubs are charged by the hour which enables parents and carers to book hours to suit their needs. The minimum chargeable unit is one hour and all sessions will be charged by the hour. Children who attend for full days or over lunchtime will also need to bring a nut-free packed lunch.

The current cost of Holiday Club sessions is £4.95 per child per hour for children aged 3 to 11 years and £5.55 per hour for children aged from 2 until the term after their third birthday. There is a £30 once-only registration fee for children who are not already registered at the Care and Learning Centre for out of school clubs.


