



Pocket Toys are Growing!



We have noticed that some of the pocket toys are becoming quite large in size and would like to remind families that they should fit into children's pockets easily. Below is a reminder of the restrictions we have put upon the toys to ensure the safety and enjoyment of all of the children.

The toy must be pocket sized i.e. able to fit into a coat pocket or trouser pocket. The toy must not be dangerous or offensive e.g. sharp.

The toy must not be a trading or swapping card.

The toy must not be used to hurt another child.

Your child must return the toy to their tray at the end of playtime/lunchtime. It is not allowed to be used during classroom/learning time. Children bring their pocket toys to school at their own risk so please do not bring toys which are very precious or of great significance to your child. School cannot take responsibility for any toys that are lost or damaged.

Sentence Starters

Ask your Reception child to add two single digit numbers together.

Ask your Year 1 child to name the four seasons.

Ask your Year 2 child to tell you what drink will have the worst effect on the egg shells.

Ask your Year 3 child to describe a character from James and the Giant peach using adventurous adjectives.

Ask your Year 4 child to explain the typical features of a comic book.

Ask your Year 5 child what expressions are used in Tudor portraits.

Ask your Year 6 child to explain what steps they needed to take to obtain a soil sample.

Following recent discussions with our Education Welfare Officer concerning the number of fixed penalty notices which have been issued to parents, I would like to bring the current rules regarding absences from school to your attention.

In September 2015, the Department of Education lowered the amount of absence in which a student is classified as being a persistent absentee from 15% to 10%. This means that any child with an attendance of less than 90% will be classed as a persistent absentee and will be monitored by the Education Welfare Officer. In these instances the Local Authority may issue a Penalty Notice. Schools will need to ensure that parents are

informed of any attendance concerns at an early stage and therefore you should expect that you will receive an initial communication from school if your child's attendance falls under 96%. The initial letter will be to simply make you aware of your child's attendance level but if concerns persist, then the school may contact you again.

Parents who take a child out of school for term time leave for 6 consecutive sessions (3 days) or more over a 4 week period which are not authorised by the school under the exceptional circumstances rule may receive a Penalty Notice, which in the first instance will be £60 per child, per adult, in the household. Failure to pay this penalty within 21 school days will result in the charge being doubled to £120. Penalty Notices will be issued for single event absences of at least 3 consecutive school days or more where these absences are unauthorised because they are deemed to be neither exceptional or unavoidable.



Each week we will be suggesting some games to help your child remember their spellings. We hope these games will be a fun way to build your child's confidence in spelling and also something that you can enjoy playing together— after all, learning should be fun.

Make Up a Mnemonic

Some children do well with this method. For example to remember the 'ough' ending for a word try: Only Ugly Giants Hitchhike. Or for 'necessary' try Never Eat Cake, Eat Salmon Sandwiches And Remain Young. Have a go at making up your own mnemonics, the more weird and wonderful the better.

The Locality team have once again been able to offer us a series of drop-in sessions and parenting workshops which will take place throughout this term.


The Locality Team provides valuable support and advice for parents on a wide range of issues. Locality Workers will be available in school for the following individual 'drop-in' sessions and workshops:
