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Camsight and goalball

Nick Burr, from the charity Camsight, visited Monkfield Park this Monday and Tuesday with his guide dog, Amber. Nick lost his sight in 2014 and talked with all of the children in assembly about how he has had to become resilient in the face of adversity by working on his talents and remaining positive.

Nick is an Olympic goalball player, a sport played by those affected by blindness or partial sight. Nick introduced the children in Years 5 and 6 to this game, where they had to wear masks to appreciate how it felt to have no sight. The children had to heighten their other senses to be able to play this team game and had to become excellent listeners. The ball used in the game has a bell inside of it, which was the only clue the children had about the ball's position on the pitch. We look forward to seeing Nick and Amber around the school more as we promote the charity Camsight this academic year.

Food tasting in Year 2

Last Friday in Year 2, the children enjoyed tasting Jewish food. The children over this half term have been learning about Sukkot, a Jewish festival celebrating harvest and remembering when the Jews had to shelter in the desert on the way to Israel.

The food tasting included trying Kugel (a Jewish pudding made with noodles and raisins), Pretzels, Vanilla Wafers, Chicken noodle and Vegetable noodle soup, and Cholla, which is Jewish, plaited bread. The children thoroughly enjoyed themselves and gave all the food a try. The whole morning got a huge thumbs up from all the children.
