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Year 6 SAW Project

This week we were fortunate enough to welcome back the SAW project (science, art and writing) into Year 6 to put all of our learning about micro-organisms from last half term into practise. After completing our own investigations a week earlier, we were able to witness which bacteria grew in the soil around the school. We then went on to look at helpful pathogens and how leaf cutter ants were revolutionising antibiotics. Using the science as inspiration, we created poems and artwork on bacteria. There was stiff competition amongst the competitors and with 7 school's competing, our team had to demonstrate their flair for stage presence as well as their ability to hold the attention of the audience through interesting content in their timed speeches. All of the children who participated did incredibly well and Monkfield Park really held their own. They certainly didn't let their nerves get the better of them, and despite the grand surroundings, they performed with confidence and competence. We are so proud of all of you and cannot wait to show off our engraved trophy, which will take pride of place within our trophy collection. Not only were the children recognised as the winning team by the judges, but Tejas was judged as the best speaker in the Year 3 and 4 category. A great achievement for us all.


