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Smart Phone Safety

I am sure you are all aware of the arguments raging in the press about the harm that children are being exposed to through social media and many of the apps they are using on their phones and tablets. Although we are constantly teaching the children about online safety and the behaviours which are expected when they are communicating with others on social media, we are under no illusions that there is still much work to be done. Despite apps such as WhatsApp having an age restriction of 16 and TikTok a limit of 13, we know that many children are being allowed to access them.

It has come to our notice that some children are posting intimidating and threatening messages on online social media platforms. If you have enabled your child to use such social media platforms, it is recommended advice that parents should monitor the way children are using this to communicate with one another e.g. are you aware of who your child is talking to and the nature of the conversations they are having? Children who are under the age limit for these apps should not be using them unaccompanied and a trusted adult should carefully monitor the content of 'chat' to ensure that children are not using inappropriate language with one another and that the nature of the conversation is appropriate. Keeping our children safe both physically and online is of the utmost importance and we must work together to ensure our children are using any online platforms appropriately and safely. We value your support and co-operation in this and we would recommend that all families have an open and frank discussion about the use of social media platforms.


Gong hei fat choy

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<u>Cambridge Therapeutic Thinking (Previously STEPS)</u>

Thank you to all those parents and carers who joined us on Wednesday for our Cambridge Therapeutic Thinking (CTT) workshops. We are now a year into our journey to implement the therapeutic approach in our school and wanted the opportunity to be able to share our new Behaviour Policy with you and to explain the research and thinking behind this approach to managing behaviour. The core philosophy of the CTT approach is that children do not learn to rectify their behaviour by being humiliated or being made to feel worse. When children feel better about themselves they behave better.

We were able to share a PowerPoint presentation which explains where we currently are on our CTT journey and some materials which offer advice and guidance for parents and carers about how you can support your child at home using similar approaches. The Behaviour Policy provides clarification about the protective and educational consequences we are using to promote the children's wellbeing, to encourage them to reflect on their behaviour choices and how these can be changed to ensure everyone is safe and happy in school. If you do have any questions, please speak to your child's class teacher in the first instance.
